Val Pohl introduced our guest speaker, Ron Gilbertson, President and CEO of the Edmonton Economic Development Corporation. Mr. Gilbertson has been with the corporation since April 2007.

Mr. Gilbertson advises that in terms of investment and GDP, the Edmonton-Calgary Corridor is the most successful economic region in North America. Edmonton has seen significant positive changes in employment, housing starts, disposable income and real GDP growth. Edmonton also is extremely attractive due to the relative affordability of housing. In the past three years, Edmonton has seen a rise in the affordability index from 20 to 40% of total income spent on housing. However, this is still very positive given the indexes for Calgary (45%), Toronto (50%) and Vancouver (70%) and Edmonton's rate is still slightly below the National average.

The Alberta oil sands are being viewed as the world's largest and most politically stable source of oil in the world. There are also some very important and startling trends occurring in the world today.

There are two macro trends occurring in all industrial nations, declining populations and aging populations. Japan as an example, is expected to see a 20% reduction in their population over the next 30 years. These trends will have huge implications on the world's labour forces.

Alberta is presently experiencing a rapid growth in the upgrading and refining of oil sands and heavy oil which are valuable feedstocks for the development of petrochemicals. There is currently \$97 billion invested or committed in upgrading facilities, \$124 billion of potential refining projects and a provincial government vision of \$179 billion in petro-chemical development up to the year 2030. It is expected that \$180 billion will be invested in these areas in just the next 10 years. Our provincial manufacturing is now heavily focused on markets outside of Canada. For example, the Nisku area is presently exporting 65% of their production out of the country.

The world economy is also rapidly changing. The U.S.A. presently accounts for 40% of the world GDP but this is expected to be less than 20% in 25 years. China and India are expected to have the 2nd and 3rd largest economies in 30 years. The decline in world poverty is expected to move from 40% to 12% in the same time frame. These economic trends present threats and opportunities for the Alberta economy. It is projected that in 10 years, 83% of all capital investment in Alberta will be located in the Edmonton Region and northern Alberta. Alberta as an energy superpower and an industrial power will need to develop strategies to deal with the availability of labour.

Alberta and Edmonton must become more globally focused to stay in the game. We will need to establish globally competent industries and a superior quality of life. What makes a great City? What is important to us? How do we compare to our world cities of our size?

The Edmonton Economic Development Corporation has developed a list of "Quality of Life" indicators as follows: Economy, Safety, Health, Social Conscience, Education, Places to Live, Environment, Recreation, Culture, Urban Transportation, External Transportation and Image. Edmonton compares very well with other cities of similar population in most of the indicator categories. Improvement is needed in the areas of Safety (Crime), Urban Transportation, External Transportation and Image.

Edmonton is the 425th largest city in the world and we will need a vision and a set of plans to navigate successfully to the future.
