President Sam Gruden welcomed 36 Gyros and four guests to the January 7th luncheon meeting held at the Royal Mayfair Golf Club. He then led us in Cheerio and David Burnett asked the blessing.

David Burnett introduced his guest, David Noble. Marty Larson, introduced Steven Rausch, the Regional Director of Major Gift and Planned Giving at the University of Alberta who is involved in administering the Gyro Gerontology scholarships. Mike Matei introduced his guest and friend Bob Kerrison. Bob is a former member of the Calgary Gyro Club and was a member of our club until work demands got in the way. He is now retired and wants to rejoin our club.

Jack Little introduced our guest speaker, Bruce Hogle who recounted some of his experiences in 50 years of broadcasting. Bruce went to high school in Sudbury and played hockey with Tim Horton and George Armstrong. Bruce was in B.C. when the Sons of Freedom were active and one incident he covered was the burning of a village where 50 houses were burned to the ground with nothing left but fireplaces, chimneys and steel bed frames. The Sons of Freedom took legal action against the paper but the editor, Bill Curran, stuck to the story and fought back. After 5 years the paper won the court case.

In 1965 his father died and they wanted Bruce to replace him at CFRN. At one point rents were increasing 4 times per year in Edmonton and Bruce was involved in a campaign that saw Premier Lougheed establish rent controls. CFRN approached the Legislature to broadcast the proceedings live - a first for Canada. After dealing with some reluctance they were granted a three month trial period. As MLA's experienced constituents saying they saw their representative on TV, they appreciated the additional profile, so after the trial period they supported continuation of the live coverage. On our behalf, Jack Little thanked Bruce for his interesting presentation.

The Alberta Centre on Agina at the University of Alberta is an interdisciplinary

The Alberta Centre on Aging at the University of Alberta is an interdisciplinary research and education centre dedicated to the study of aging. The Centre's focus is on aging as a process, including but not exclusive to the situations of older adults. The Gyro Club of Edmonton has a long-standing relationship with the Centre and over the years individual club members and the club as a whole have generously donated funds for the establishment of the Centre for Gerontology Fund.

The endowment fund provides yearly, one undergraduate scholarship of \$700, and a Master's and PhD scholarship each of \$1200.

The Alberta Centre on Aging has completed the adjudication process for the 2013-2014 Gyro Club of Edmonton Graduate and Undergraduate Scholarships in Aging.

This year's recipient of the Gyro Club of Edmonton Graduate Scholarship in Aging at the PhD level is Hannah O'Rourke.

Hannah is a PhD student in Nursing. Her thesis is on promising intervention targets to improve quality of life for older adults with dementia and will defend in the fall of 2014. Her long term goal is to become an independent investigator with a program of research to design and test translatable, sustainable interventions to improve quality of life for older adults with dementia.

The recipient for the Master's level award is **Travis Featherstone**. Travis is in his second year with the Faculty of Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Studies under the supervision of Dr. Scot Simpson.

His thesis focuses on the Impact of pharmacist intervention on health outcomes in diabetes in senior population. He has worked the last four years as a clinical pharmacist in supportive living in Edmonton. He was part of a team that developed an Anticoagulation Monitoring Program by Pharmacists in Supportive Living.

Travis also received the Gyro's Undergraduate Research Award for 2008-09.

Amanda Warnock is the recipient of the Undergraduate Scholarship in Aging. She is studying Neuroscience and will complete her undergraduate degree later this year. Her next step is to return next year for some addition undergraduate courses and possibly travel abroad with a research internship. She then plans on applying to medical school, where she hopes to specialize in psychiatry or neurology, where she believes that she will be able to direct her knowledge in assisting with diagnosis and treatment of mental diseases, including those that pertain to cognitive/physical decline and the aging process.

Sam Gruden and Marty Larson presented these scholarships at the January 17th Research on Aging: Nibble, Nosh and Network Event at the University of Alberta.

President Sam Gruden welcomed 35 Gyros and 10 guests to the January 21st luncheon meeting held at the Royal Mayfair Golf Club. President Sam led the group in the singing of Cheerio and Jim Lochhead gave the blessing.

Ken Korchinski introduced his guest John Collins, Jack Little, his guest Bruce Hogle, Larry Dobson, his guest Brian Steilo, Mike Matei, his guests Doug Clayton, Dave Geddes, Tim Cartmell and Schubert Kwan. Peter Carter and Bob Kerrison were acknowledged as rejoining Gyros. Bob was a member of the Calgary Gyro Club as well as a member of the Edmonton Club from 1980 to 1989. Peter was a member of our club for 14 years from 1996-2010.

Allan Warrack introduced our guest speaker Tim Shipton, Vice President of Communications for Rexall Sports Corp. Tim was raised in Barrhead, Alberta and was President of the Alberta Enterprise Group until his appointment to Rexall on October 23, 2013. Tim's responsibilities include overseeing content for Edmonton Oilers.com and related company websites, along with all facets of the team's social media channels. Tim will also act as the lead liaison with Canadian news media on behalf of Rexall Sports. He will also be responsible for content management of all Oilers live media, including the Oilers on Sportsnet television presented by Rogers and the Oilers on 630 CHED radio broadcasts. Tim indicated that digital and social media interest now generates one million Oiler internet actions per month.

Tim began his talk by remarking that he understood that GYRO was a friendship organization; he said "the Oilers could certainly use a little friendship now." **Darryl Katz** understands these frustrations and made public his letter to citizens and fans on January 20th. His letter

emphasized player development in the Oklahoma City and Bakersfield clubs and the revamping of their scouting organization. It will be painful rebuilding process but they are not going to panic. The fans have been incredibly patient and supportive.

Tim indicated that new Oiler, Andrew Ference is the type of experienced player that will help the team achieve its goals.

The Arena Project is moving forward as planned and the final decision will be made by the City of Edmonton and Rexall Sports Corp. on February 11, 2014. The final cost of \$480 million is expected to be maintained and construction could start in March with completion for the opening of the hockey season in 2016. The newly named Rogers Place will seat 18,500 fans with good sighting views. There is the potential for three million square feet of development on the 22 acre "Arena District." A number of residential condo towers, office buildings and a major hotel are expected to be developed in the district. Over 2,000,000 visitors are expected annually. Underground parking will be developed to accommodate 10,000 vehicles. The current Rexall Place/Northlands area has 8,500 surface parking stalls.

Roy Bennett thanked Tim for a very interesting and questiongenerating presentation.
