PRESIDENT'S COCKTAIL AND CHRISTMAS PARTY

The President's Cocktail and Christmas Party was held om Sunday, December 10, 1978 at the Club Mocombo, St. Albert, with some 80 odd Gyros, Gyrettes, and Guests im attendance. Following a social hour dinner was served, after which Padre Dr. Jess Bigelow spoke on Peace, the central thems of the celebration of Christmas in the Christian world.

Im his capacity as Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, Dr. Jess, in the past year has travelled some 30,000 miles (48,000 kilometers), and has had an opportunity to observe first hand the relationship of the Church with its strong support of Peace, to various political regimes in different parts of the world.

The speaker told of two types of Peace - the Peace of Christ which had its origin some 2,000 years ago in Bethlehem and Pax Romana.

The Peace of Christ, he said, was im mood quiet, calm, and sereme. The very setting and the nature of the things associated with the Christian Peace suggested tranquility - the pastoral scene, the crowded inm, and the stable with its cattle, sheep, and donkeys. As well the carols heralding this significant event maintain this composed, pacific atmosphere - "Silent might! Holy night!"; "O Little town of Bethlehem, How still we see thee lie"; "While shepherds watched

their flocks by night, The angel of the Lord came down." This is the kind of Peace people will

accept willingly.

Im contrast to this, stated Dr. Bigelow, was the Peace of Rome imposed from without by military force. There was no questioning of the Rule of Rome; the Jews were ordered to register with the taxing authorities. The sort of Peace under these circumstances, said the speaker, forced om a people by tyranny could only be an apprenhensive Peace. It represented a total limitation of human rights. Only a Peace that guarantees hope, liberty, justice, and good will could prevail. Even today he declared, there are throughout the world many dictatorial governments (over)

whose people have neither liberty nor justice, and hence no real Peace.

Im conclusion, Padre Bigelow suggested that True Peace would only be established when all men accepted the truth of the angelic anthem, "Glory to God in the highest and Peace to men with whom God is well pleased." When mankind acknowledges Christ as the Ruler, he said, then will there be justice, freedom, and Peace.

Following the talk the Dell Hill Dancers, Katherine Horlor, and Caroline Kennard, accompanied by Piper Chris Stewart entertained the gathering with some Scottish dances.

The evening concluded with a Christmas Carol Sing-Song led by Flora Peterson and Harry Mills.

It was a splendid evening of Gyro friendship and fellowship, and to Birt and Jack we extend our sincere thanks and appreciation.
