

Bruce Foy introduced Dr. Jim Montgomery who graduated with a Civil Engineering degree from the University of Alberta (U. of A.) in 1973 and obtained post-graduate degrees from the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign. He then joined the Department of Civil Engineering at the U. of A. where he held positions as Assistant and Associate Professor from 1977 until 1981. In 1981, Jim became a principal in the structural engineering firm of Lamb McManus Associates Ltd., where he provided construction engineering services to contractors and designed a number of buildings and bridges.

Jim Montgomery joined Cohos Evamy Architects in 1988 which became Dialog in 2010. As Chief Engineer and a senior financial partner, the company transitioned to a fully integrated design firm. Dr. Montgomery is currently working on the design of the Walterdale Bridge Replacement.

The current Walterdale Bridge was built by Dominion Bridge Company and opened in 1913. It is a truss design, 214.2 metres in length and replaced the Ross Flats Ferry service operated by John Walter. John Walter operated a large sawmill and built a number of residences on the lands currently occupied by the Kinsmen Field House and Recreation Centre.

During the concept planning phase, the City of Edmonton and a number of engineering consultants looked at bridge design options. These included the Girder, which is the most common design used in Alberta for virtually all modern highway and river crossings. The Cable Stayed design consists of towers and cables but unlike a suspension bridge, does not require anchor blocks which significantly add to the cost. The Extradosed type is a hybrid of the girder and cable stayed designs which reduces the number of piers and allows for a lower tower profile. The decision was made to use the Arch design which eliminates the need for any piers in the North Saskatchewan River and is believed to be a more interesting and beautiful design.

A considerable amount of time has been spent documenting and protecting the human/historical resources in the immediate vicinity of the new bridge right-of-way on both sides of the North Saskatchewan River. A number of First Nation burial sites are located on the north shore and there has been documented evidence of settlement dating back 100's and likely 1000's of years.

Three alternative Arch designs were prepared. Alternative 2 allowed for separated pedestrian/bicycle access. The shared-use walkway/promenade will be located on the downstream side of the bridge and attached to the main arch structure on the south shore while connecting to the north shore on a separate pier. Pedestrian/bicycle access will be provided under the north shore bridge decks. A conventional sidewalk will also be constructed on the upstream side of the bridge deck. The arch design bridge span will be 206 metres with a total bridge length of 230 metres. The height of the top of the arch will be over 40 metres. The new bridge will provide three lanes of traffic north bound and will have a total capital cost of \$126 million.

A number of questions were asked about the safety/design aspects of the new bridge given the recent catastrophic collapse of one span of the I-5 Bridge over the Skagit River in Northern Washington State. The new Walterdale Bridge has been designed to withstand total collapse due to a single destruction of a bridge element. Another question centred on the ability of bridge components to withstand rust/corrosion over the long term. Bridge steel and cable components can be designed to minimize total replacement over long periods of time. A classic example is the Brooklyn Bridge in New York City which was completed in 1883 with galvanized steel cable bundles which have yet to be replaced.

Len Stevens thanked our speaker for providing an excellent insight into the design of the new Walterdale Bridge.

Ari Hoeksema was the winner of the Free Lunch draw.

A proposed Benevolence Vision and recommendations on the disbursement of monies held in our Benevolence Fund was presented to our membership at the April 2nd Luncheon meeting. The vision and recommendations were unanimously approved. Four charitable organizations who made presentations in 2012-13 were each given \$500. These organizations are: Pilgrims Hospice Society, The Institute for Stuttering Treatment and Research (ISTAR), Excel Society Edmonton and Edmonton Dream Centre. In addition, a \$4000 cheque was delivered to The Edmonton Community Foundation for use in the Gyro Club of Edmonton Fund. This fund was established in 2008 with a donation of \$16,500. Our fund combined with the larger Lee Community Playspace Fund provides funding to enhance recreational and community building opportunities for children and their families through the development of community playgrounds and playspaces in the greater Edmonton area with priority given to low-income neighbourhoods.

Jamie Fleming, former Chair of the Board for the Institute for Stuttering Treatment and Research has expressed his deep appreciation to our Club for making a donation to this organization.

Lerena Grieg, Acting CEO of Edmonton Dream Centre, has in her letter of June 10th, thanked us for our generosity and support. "Your donation helps to practically enable us to continue our work as we seek to reach out to and provide hope for lost, hurting and vulnerable women and their children."

Marion Boyd, one of the founders of the Pilgrims Hospice Society has also expressed her appreciation for our recent donation.

The **Excel Society** which operates 36 special-care residential facilities in Edmonton has also expressed their thanks in a letter to our club.

Dick Nichols reported on the results of the 2012-13 Hockey Pool season. \$4560 was raised through the sale of 228 tickets and \$2280 was paid out to winning ticket holders. \$2200 will be deposited in our Benevolence Fund.

Fred Schulte presented information regarding a proposal by Bernie Kropp, Past Governor and member of the Sherwood Park Gyro Club to hold a Gyro/Gyrette Quad club golf tourney in late August/early September. There was limited interest expressed by approximately six members and David Dyck volunteered to be our club contact.

Jack Slobodan introduced our guest speaker Lewis Cardinal, a Woodland Cree from northern Alberta. As a communicator and educator, Lewis has dedicated his work to creating and maintaining connections and relationships that cross cultural divides. His work has mirrored his personal vision of a socially just and responsive society. His long track record of public service includes founding board member of Racism Free Edmonton, Executive Board Member of the John Humphrey Centre for Peace and Human Rights, Founder and Co-Chair of the Indigenous Peoples' Art and Culture Coalition, Board member of Little Warriors, former Chair of Edmonton Aboriginal Urban Affairs Committee, Bissell Centre Board of Governors, Chair and Founder of Global Indigenous Dialogue, Trustee and executive member of the Council for a Parliament of World Religions and executive Vice-President of the Aboriginal Voices Radio Network.

Lewis is the owner of Cardinal Strategic Communications, specializing in Education, Governance and Communications.

Lewis began his presentation by indicating that <code>Canada:Kanata is a Verb</code>. Indigenous languages are verb based. The <code>Cree-Algonquin</code> direct translation is "To Make Clean" or "Pure". The connotation is "To Make Sacred". It is all about relationships with self, with others, with the environment and with the spirit world and the cosmos. We have had 200 years of mutual benefit in trade good relations and peace/friendship treaties. The War of 1812 was the first time we fought side by side as "Brothers in Arms". This was the birth of Canada and it coincided with the Age of Colonization and the "Indian Problem". There was a deliberate move in the engineering of public attitudes with references to the "Dying Race" and "Those Uncivilized Savages". A governmental forced assimilation policy followed with treaties impacted by the Indian Act.

Pehonan "The Waiting Place" has been a gathering place in the Rossdale Flats area of Edmonton for 10,000 years. Many nations gathered for trade, ceremony and celebrations. Trading goods also included medicinal products. Buffalo crossed the North Saskatchewan River at the present Walterdale Bridge crossing. In more recent times, fur traders were told that the Rossdale Flats area was a sacred place and that they should locate their fort/fur trading site up on the hill. This hill is now the site of the provincial Legislature. The Pehonan was governed by the concept of Wicihitowin: "Helping Each Other". This concept is also defined as "Relationship".

Edmonton is recognized as a very special place. Monto: "Divine Essence" indicates that "There is Spirit in Place", the Creator's energy and connecting and reconnecting to it. The spirit of this place percolates through what we do as a city and its citizens. Edmonton is a "City of Spirit". "Monto" in Edmonton, Edmonton.

Mr. Cardinal finished his presentation by stressing that given our shared history that the potential for renewal of relationships exist.

Walter Yakimets thanked our speaker for an excellent presentation and noted that Toronto is not the centre of the universe.

The Free Lunch draw was won by Gary Campbell.
