Andy Friderichsen reached a remarkable milestone on May 13th when he turned 90 years young. Andreas (Andy) was born in Copenhagen, Denmark and was one of two sons and two daughters in the Friderichsen family. Andy's mother died a few days short of 100 years and his grandmother also lived to be 100.

Andy attended a boys school, followed by a gymnastic school and then worked on farms during the Second World War, reaching the managerial level. Andy also spent a year in England where he was a butler to a wealthy family living in a castle. In 1950, he decided to try life in Canada and worked in a variety of jobs including six years with the C.N.R. Andy met Blanche in 1955 and they eloped the following year and spent three months in Denmark and Europe honeymooning.

Andy accepted an offer to be farm manager in Kenya on a farm owned by an Italian corporation. The Mau Mau Rebellion ended that adventure. The rebellion was a military conflict that took place in Kenya (then called British East Africa), between 1952 and 1960. It involved a Kikuyu-dominated anti-colonial group called Mau Mau and elements of the British Army, auxiliaries and anti-Mau Mau Kikuyu. The conflict set the stage for Kenyan independence in 1963.

Back in Edmonton, Andy attended Alberta College and the University of Alberta, Faculty of Agriculture. He then spent six years as a Funeral Director at Hainstocks. Thanks to Roger Russell, Andy joined Gyro in 1984. Andy spent the last 21 years of his working career at McBain's Camera as Manager of Audio-Visual Services. Blanche spent her last 21 years with Alberta Education in Library Science. They both retired within a week of each other in 1987. Andy's hobbies include woodworking, silver-smithing and reading. Andy and Blanche have travelled the world, undertaking 50 cruises and visiting friends and family.

President Ari Hoeksema welcomed 21 Gyro's and one guest to the May 17th Business luncheon meeting held at the Royal Mayfair Golf Club. Dick Nichols led the group in the singing of Cheerio and Jim Lochhead gave the Grace. Allan Warrack introduced his guest Jamie Fleming.

The purpose of the meeting was to review the resolutions approved by the Gyro International Board of Governors meeting held in Savannah, Georgia in January 2011. The Executive Council of Gyro International will be considering these resolutions at the International Convention to be held in Halifax, Nova Scotia, July 4-10th, 2011. These resolutions will be accepted, amended or rejected at this convention.

Gerry Glassford, Past District Governor, presented background information on the Gyro Districts as a preamble to the discussion on the Gyro District IV Recommendations for "Our GYRO in the 21St Century", dated December 9th, 2010. This document was presented to the Board of Governors at the Gyro International Interim Meeting held in Savannah, Georgia.

Marty Larson, Past District Governor and Past International; President, gave some further background context for the proposed changes.

The Gyro Club of Edmonton presently submits \$50 for each member annually to Gyro International.

Discussion by various members resulted in a consensus that the proposed International dues increase of \$10 is not out of line with inflation and the challenges facing a large voluntary organization. A reduction in the number of International Executive Council members will likely mean less talented people will agree to stand for office. It appears that the Gyro International Executive Council faces an "optics" problem with how the business side of the organization is delivered. One of the symptoms of this problem is opposition to any International dues increase whatsoever by some clubs and districts.

There needs to be a refocus of the business side of Gyro International and District organizations. There is a lack of transparency of financial matters at Gyro International. At the International and District level, consideration should be given to more focus on the business side of Gyro at Interim Meetings. The International and District Conventions could then focus more heavily on the friendship/fun side of Gyro.

The decline in membership must be addressed at the District and club level and we should be looking at the successful clubs to determine what makes it work for them.

Our detailed response to the proposed changes to the Gyro International Executive Council structure which was considered and approved by the Board of Governors in Savannah, Georgia will be forwarded to our District Governor by June 1st.

#### GOVERNMENTIUM: A New Metal?

Lawrence Livermore Laboratories has discovered the heaviest element yet known to science. The new element, Governmentium (Gv), has one neutron, 25 assistant neutrons, 88 deputy neutrons, and 198 assistant deputy neutrons, giving it an atomic mass of 312. These 312 particles are held together by forces called morons, which are surrounded by vast quantities of lepton-like particles called peons. Since Governmentium has no electrons, it is inert; however it can be detected, because it impedes every reaction with which it comes into contact. A tiny amount of Governmentium can cause a reaction that would normally take less than a second, to take from 4 days to 4 years to complete.

Governmentium has a normal half-life of 2-6 years. It does not decay, but instead undergoes a reorganization in which a portion of the assistant neutrons and deputy neutrons exchange places. In fact, Governmentium's mass will actually increase over time, since each reorganization will cause more morons to become neutrons, forming isodopes. This characteristic of morons' promotion leads some scientists to believe that Governmentium is formed whenever morons reach a critical concentration. This hypothetical quantity is referred to as critical morass. When catalyzed with money, Governmentium becomes Adminstratrium, an element that radiates just as much energy as Governmentium since it has half as many peons but twice as many morons.
